### Welcome

The Great North Air Ambulance Service (GNAAS) has responded more than 20,000 times since the charity was first registered in 2002. In that time the charity has grown and developed its level of care, but our objective remains the same - to save lives and ease suffering across the North East, North Yorkshire and Cumbria.

At 20,000, the call-out numbers may be huge, but every response is unique. And each one represents the apex moment at which the skills of our on-duty clinical team combine with everything that has enabled their involvement - the years of painstaking research and innovation, the team's preparation and rigorous training, the investments in pioneering equipment, the hours given by our selfless volunteers, the hard-earned pounds donated by generous supporters, the charity's compulsion to improve on excellence.

To help us respond to the next 20,000 call-outs and beyond, we are looking for a Chief Executive Officer to take over from our founder Grahame Pickering MBE at a hugely exciting time for the charity.

### What we do:



#### Critical care

GNAAS operates air ambulances and rapid response cars 365 days a year across our area.



#### Training

We run training courses for clinicians from all over the world as well as closer to home.



### **Fundraising**

We need to generate more than £5 million every year to allow the charity to keep responding at current levels.



#### Trading

trading subsidiaries:

- A recycling company which collects clothing and other items to sell on to buyers around the world.
- ARC Medtech, set up to generate revenue from a software system developed by the charity which manages operational tasking, patient records and data audit.

### What we stand for



#### Vision

To provide a world-class pre-hospital care service for the people of the region.



To extend and constantly seek to improve emergency pre-hospital and inter-hospital critical care across our region.



The aim of the charity is the provision and maintenance of highly specialised pre-hospital care teams whose primary purpose is to halt the physical deterioration and reverse the life-threatening process caused by severe injury or the rapid onset of acute illness, which are common causes of death. The chances of a patient surviving are highly dependent on the advanced level of care these uniquely specialised teams provide.

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### How we got here



1991
An appeal was launched to fund an air ambulance helicopter for the North East of England.



1994
The North East's first air ambulance helicopter begins work for the ambulance service.



2001
The Great North Air Ambulance
Service is formed with the
objective of operating and funding
the air ambulance independently.



2006
The charity first offers a seven day a week service.



2004 GNAAS expands its area of operation to include Cumbria.



2002
The charity is registered with the Charity Commission and over the next few years grows its annual income from £100,000 to £1,000,000.



2015

The charity becomes one of the first in the country to carry blood on its missions, a move which is later estimated to have saved 18 lives in its first year alone.



2019

Progress House, the charity's new headquarters, opens its doors for the first time with fundraising, administration and other support services moving into the facility near Eaglescliffe.



2020

The aircraft and operational team move into Progress House and the base at Teesside Airport is closed. Guardian of the North II joins the fleet.

### What sets us apart?

#### The team

GNAAS was one of the first air ambulances to carry doctors on board. From the very early stages this was seen to be vital in bringing hospital-level care to the scene of illness or injury. Having a doctor as part of the team allows for advanced treatments such as blood transfusions, surgeries and anaesthetics.

#### Independence

GNAAS is just one part of the emergency response alongside police, ambulance and fire services and mountain rescue. But its independence from these agencies has allowed it to specialise in pre-hospital care. Collaborative independence has been crucial to many achievements throughout the charity's history.

### Research and training

The charity places great emphasis on always looking to improve its practice through research and training. Bloods and ultrasound are two life-saving advancements that have come about through detailed research. The charity's teams train relentlessly while also sharing knowledge with clinicians from around the world through accredited training courses.



### Where we are now



#### Bases

The GNAAS headquarters is at Progress House, near Eaglescliffe, Stockton-on-Tees. Progress House is home to the charity services team which includes fundraising, administration and other support services. Progress House is also the base of the charity's North East operations team, which responds by helicopter and car from the site.

The charity's other operational base is at Langwathby, near Penrith in Cumbria. This site provides a central location from which the vast majority of Cumbria can be reached within 20 minutes of flying. The team based at Langwathby also frequently fly into Northumberland.

The two operational teams also unite when multiple air ambulance resources are required anywhere in the region.

#### Fleet

The charity's primary mode of transport is by helicopter. An aircraft is on duty at each base 365 days a year.

The helicopters are supported by a rapid response car, which is also used overnight four nights a week in the North East in a collaboration with North East Ambulance Service.

The latest addition to the fleet is the Guardian of the North II, a Dauphin AS365 N3+ aircraft which started service in August.



#### The GNAAS team

The operational team consists of 13 full time paramedics, two support staff and around 25 doctors who work primarily in hospitals around the region but who work shifts as part of the charity's critical care team.

Charity services includes 50 staff spread across business support, fundraising and marketing and communications.

The charity's recycling subsidiary employs around 15 people and operates from Newton Aycliffe.

Volunteers also play a key role across the organisation, with 112 people volunteering for GNAAS over the last financial year.



### Where we want to be

Reaching more of the patients who need us most

We want to be there for those people who we can have most impact on - the most seriously ill and injured.


This involves a sophisticated tasking process. It also involves expanding our hours of operation. Over the last few years, we have made strides towards providing a 24/7 service in the North East with the provision of an overnight rapid response car. This has had a positive impact on hundreds of patients. We want to bring that project to a successful conclusion while also kick-starting a similar service in Cumbria.



Innovation isn't limited to our operational team. For every clinical advancement or new piece of equipment, we must have the fundraising activity in place to support it.

The fundraising landscape is changing, and our team is constantly looking for new trends to work alongside the tried and trusted methods, as well as seeking to make the most of the world-class facilities and experts at our disposal.

### **Upgrading our fleet**

It is expected that the Guardian of the North II aircraft, which started work in August, will serve the region for the next ten years and beyond.

Although our pre-existing fleet of helicopters will continue to perform admirably for as long as we need them, a second new aircraft will be vital in maintaining a seamless, reliable and high-performing service across our whole region.



### How do we fund it?

In the last financial year, GNAAS raised £7.5m to support the continuation and enhancement of our service. Here is how we generated that income:

For every £1 spent on fundraising we generated £4.88

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
## **Chief Executive Officer – Job Description**


